Developing and broadening our skill set as a staff body will enable us to continue to meet the diverse range of needs our students have now and into the future.

Looking forward to the next academic year, I know that all of the staff commit to continuing to improve our practice so that we are confident that our best is good enough for the students at Uffculme. We will take up more opportunities to collaborate with other practitioners locally (Birmingham) as well nationally to make ensure that we are able to meet the Uffculme Mission Statement.

We have also enjoyed learning about the royal family and had a fantastic time at our Jubilee picnic.





Changes in rules for Universal Credit Claims by disabled young people

Some parents may have heard about the changes that have been made by the government to Universal Credit for young people (16+) who are still in education.

Under the new rules, it states that any young person who is 'receiving education' is not eligible for Universal Credit – however, according to the information shared by Contact a Family, there are some exemptions to these rules that are relevant for our students and their families when making Universal Credit claims.

The rules and exemptions for these claims can be really confusing, however Contact a Family has provided some key points in regards to the new eligibility and there are exemptions that would mean our students may be eligible still – even under the new rules.

The main exemption that applies to our students is that -

Disabled students who get Disability Living Allowance (DLA) or Personal Independence Payment (PIP), but only if they have also established a limited capability for work before they started receiving education **are** able to claim.

Support agency Contact a Family also advises that due to the changes in eligibility for Universal Credit, when your child turns 16, you make a 'credits only' claim for new style Employment and Support Allowance. This forces the DWP to carry out a work capability assessment, which could establish in advance that your child has 'a limited capability for work- and work-related activity' (LCWRA).

They advise that in reality the claim for ESA will not be successful as your son or daughter will not have paid any national insurance contributions in, however what it will do is establish a LCWRA for your son or daughter and this will stay on the system until your son or daughter claims once more when they are 19 years old.

Note: If your child does get Universal Credit in their own right, any benefits that you receive for them as a dependent child, such as Child Benefit or tax credits, will stop.

Before claiming Universal Credit for a child aged 16-19 in education, get advice. Make sure that you will not be worse off as a household.

School info

Parents, especially those with primary age children, will be aware that it has been a difficult year on our Woodlands site, which has faced the challenges of: failed electrics, a major red diesel leak and multiple boiler issues. However, on a more positive note, Woodpeckers classroom has now been refurbished and there are a number of significant projects taking place over the summer holidays to further improve our facilities.

At Woodlands, the gates are going to be upgraded to improve security and safety on site. Following the classroom refurbishments in Foundation Stage last summer, the toilet area is going to be refurbished.

The Local Authority will also start works to replace the very old boilers. It is also hoped that, following the fuel leak, further work to decontaminate the car park and Forest School will take place over the break.

At Chamberlain, three new temporary classrooms are being installed to support the growing numbers of students, perimeter fencing is being replaced and a number of areas will be redecorated.



School Meals

When your child first starts at Uffculme School, we ask what their meal booking pattern will be. Over time, your child's requirements may change. If you would like to change your child's meal booking pattern please email enquiry@uffculme.bham.sch.uk and include the following information:

- Your child's name
- The new meal booking pattern for each day
- The date you would like this to start from (please allow 24 hours' notice for any changes)

All payments for school meals must be made on ParentPay **in advance**. If you require any support with ParentPay or require your activation details, please contact the school office.

If your child may be eligible for free school meals you can complete an online check: https://www.cloudforedu.org.uk/ofsm/birmingham (link on school website). You will receive an instant decision and the school will also be notified of the outcome by email. You only need to apply once, if your eligibility changes since the initial

application school will be notified automatically.

Children in reception class that are of compulsory school age, until the end of year 2 are currently entitled to universal free school meals. When your child moves into year 3 you will be charged for school meals unless your child is eligible for free school meals or you make any changes to your child's meal booking pattern before then.

Annual statement from Governors

John Garrett—Chair of Governors

Governors would like to take this opportunity to wish all those children that are leaving the school, and their families the very best for the future, to thank all the staff at Uffculme for their hard work and dedication, and to say a little bit about the work of the governing body ahead of the next academic year.

The role of governors.

The governing body is made up of parent representatives, the headteacher and a staff representative, alongside volunteers from the community. The governing body forms an important part of school governance. The governing body are responsible for:

Developing a vision and strategy for the school

Overseeing financial performance and making sure money is well spent

Holding the school leader to account

We are not responsible for the day to day running of the school which lies with the headteacher and her team.

We meet as a full governing board six times a year.

We will be holding elections for parent governors early in the Autumn term and hope that some of you will feel able to consider joining us.

Looking forward.

The number of children seeking a place at Uffculme continues to grow, including those with complex needs, reflecting both the good reputation of the school and a growing need for special education. The governors support a long-term strategy for the school that seeks to increase the number of school places, meeting the individual needs of all pupils through an enriched curriculum that supports both academic and personal development.

We are conscious that the buildings and facilities at Uffculme are not all in good condition and do not provide the best environment for learning. Governors have prioritized site surveys and physical improvements to the school. The school has been supported by the Council and improvements made, but a great deal remains to be done. This will remain a priority for next year.

The school manages its finances well and this has enabled governors to support additional investment in improvements from the school budget. We have set a budget for 2022/23 which will enable the school to maintain staffing levels whilst investing in training and development and improved facilities.

Although governor attendance at meetings is good we are very conscious that there are not enough of us and we have not spent enough time in school observing and seeking feedback from staff or parents. We intend to make sure we spend more time in school next year and we look forward to meeting some of you then.

Safeguarding Governor—Kate Taylor

This year I have taken on the important role of Safeguarding Governor. This means I check that the many measures used to ensure the school is run safely for everyone are all working well. I conducted a visit earlier in the year and was really pleased to see that all the correct procedures are in place for safeguarding staff and children and that all the paperwork is up to date and easily accessible. During meetings I have been able to see that some improvements have been made to safeguarding procedures, for staff and children, and I am confident that these will have a positive impact. In the coming year I would like to visit school and talk to children to ask them about whether they feel safe in school and if there is anything they would like governors to do to support them. I would also like to ensure parents are aware of the many measures school undertakes to keep children safe and again speak to them to see how governors can support them.
